My dear readers,

This week, let’s ponder the role of money in men’s lives, since the whole world is presently over-burdened with the global economic collapse. Firstly, we have an interesting article from Christian News.

1. A conversation with the world’s two richest men

On an international flight recently I watched a 2006 question-answer session between two of the world’s richest men, Bill Gates and Warren Buffett, and students at the University of Nebraska School of Business. Their answers were interesting and entertaining (Buffett has a great sense of humor).



But in spite of the fact that the questions dealt with many non-business things (such as, “How do you define success in life?” and, “If you could have a superpower what would it be?” and, “What responsibility do you have to the world”), I was struck at how totally focused these men are on this present life.

They said things such as, “Pursue your own passion,” and, “Know how to say no,” and, “It is good to encourage your friends and advisors to correct your blind spots,” and, “You are a success if you get to be old and you have lots of people who love you.”

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But what most interested me was what these two immensely wealthy and influential men did not say. They said nothing about such things as salvation, man's relationship with God, the purpose of life, or preparation for eternity.

When asked, "Where do you envision yourself in 10 years?" neither of them mentioned heaven or hell. Rather, both talked as if they will be doing the same thing then as now. It reminds me of the words of Jesus, "*For what shall it profit a man, if he shall gain the whole world, and lose his own soul?*" (Mark 8:36).

2. What Charles Spurgeon said about "Prosperity"

It is a very serious thing to grow rich! Of all the temptations to which God's children are exposed, it is the worst, because it is one that they do not dread. Therefore, it is the more subtle temptation.

Where one man has been ruined by adversity, many more have been destroyed by prosperity.

Prosperity is much harder to bear than adversity. As the fining pot to silver and the furnace to gold, so is prosperity to a Christian. Many a man will pass through trouble and praise God under it, who, when he is tried with no trouble, will forget his God, decline in grace, and grow almost a worldling. Believe me, there is no trial as great as no trial.

Saving is good, but the first thing that a man has to do is to see to the saving of his soul. And there are some who always look so much to the saving of their wealth that their soul stands very little chance of being saved.

I believe it is anti-Christian and unholy for an Christian to live with the object of accumulating wealth. You will say, "Are we not to strive all we can to get all the money we can?"

You may do so. You should do so. I cannot doubt that what, in so doing, you may do good service to the cause of God. But what I said was that to live with the object of accumulating wealth is anti-Christian.

You remember how the old Puritan put it. He had been rich and then was brought to poverty. And he said he didn't find much difference, for when he was rich he found God in all, and now that he was poor he found all in God. Perhaps the latter is the higher state of the two.

I have heard of the stewardess of an American vessel, who, when the ship was sinking, saw a heap of gold coins scattered upon the cabin floor by those who had thrown it there in the confusion of their escape. She gathered up large quantities of it, wrapped it round her waist, and leaped into the water. She sank like a millstone, as though she had studiously prepared herself for destruction.

3. Final word on Wealth

What good is it?

It is recorded of one of America's richest men that before he died said to a friend: "I don't see what good it does me - all this money that you say is mine. I can't eat it, can't spend..."

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it; in fact, I never saw it, and never had it in my hand for a moment. I dress no better than my private secretary, and cannot eat as much as my coachman. I live in a big servants' boarding house, have dyspepsia, cannot drink champagne, and most of my money is in the hands of others, who use it mainly for their own benefit."
